On the bright side I believe a "Happy Holidays" is in order. The holiday tree in the park will be lit soon and hot toddy's will need to be consumed at Winterfest on South Pearl. Hopefully you have fun plans, as I do, to spend the holiday with loved ones, friends, neighbors or just quiet evenings by the fire getting some much-needed rest.

On a personal note, this is the twentieth year I've been writing this little collection of meandering whatnot. Thanks to my faithful readership for following along all these years. Thanks to Sharon Withers (then 3PA president) for the innocent sounding invitation 20 years ago to *help out with the newsletter*. I had no idea....

Speaking of 3PA, I went to the October 15 neighborhood meeting at Highlands Church. This is always a good use of time as you learn a bunch of stuff about the neighborhood. Here are a few highlights worth passing along.

Flor Alvidrez (Councilperson in District 7) gave some updates. She let us know that construction on the Jewell Ave/Santa Fe bike and pedestrian overpass will finally be underway in the first quarter of 2025. Then, construction will begin for the new bike and pedestrian path under the railroad bridge on Iowa connecting Platt Park to Overland and the Platte River trail system. Both projects should make riding a bike or walking from Platt Park to the trail system a much more pleasant and safe experience. Excellent!

The cops showed up. Well, they do that for most every meeting to give a report and answer questions. Community Resource Officer (CRO) Kate Young and her colleagues reported that overall crime has been trending down in our neighborhood which is great. It occurred to me as I listened, that Denver has extensive systems in place to deal with anything that comes up with city life... from homelessness to graffiti, street racing, public nuisances, zoning concerns, and crime of all sorts. If it is a problem in the city, there is probably a phone number or community resource to help deal with it. It was encouraging to hear a few neighbors (who were having an issue on one of our blocks) share that by working with the police, the problem was addressed and solved. Here are just a few key phone numbers to keep as a resource:

311 - This is the general go-to phone number for the City of Denver. Have a question about most anything and don't know where to turn? Start here and they will direct you.

720-913-2000 - This is the non-emergency Denver Police number. If you are pretty sure it is a police matter but not an emergency, then give them a call. **911** - As you know, go here when there is an emergency of any sort. Officer Young emphasized the importance of leaving your name and phone number in the event that follow-up information is needed by the police.

You probably have noticed by now the hard-to-miss bright pink tiny home looking thing parked on the old 7-11 parking lot on the corner of Louisiana and Pearl. I didn't think much of it until one day the teal shutters were flung wide open and there were about 50 people queued up out front. The lines seemed to last for days on end which finally triggered my highly tuned investigative instincts that something might be going on. The tiny home is named **Call Your Mother**, which on the surface, told me nothing. It wasn't until I finally got in line and figured out that it was a deli of sorts. Labeling themselves a "Jew-ish deli", the name "Call Your Mother" was an allusion to the owner's Jewish roots.

Call Your Mother is a national chain that began in Washington D.C. in 2018 and soon thereafter expanded to the Denver market with brick-and-mortar locations in Berkeley, Hilltop and Cap Hill. Co-founder Andrew Dana wants to add a fourth permanent location in Platt Park but opted first to debut the concept via the food truck. Said Dana of Platt Park after visiting the Farmers Market one Sunday, "Oh my God, this place is amazing"—duh.

They are open for breakfast and lunch (7am till 3pm) and the menu features an assortment of bagels, breakfast and lunch sandwiches, coffee, sodas, and juice. I tried the sesame bagel with plain cream cheese and smoked salmon, and it was fantastic. The bagel was fresh, the salmon portion was generous, and the cream cheese was soft - just the way my mother would make it (maybe?). Lines have died down for the most part, so drop by and check it out. *callyourmotherdeli.com*

While we are at it, we have a brief update on what is happening to the old 7-11 and south half of the 1200 block of Pearl. The block is now owned by the Denver-based Kentro Group. Kentro has submitted plans to the city to build a nearly 200,000 square-foot apartment complex with ground floor retail space. That block is zoned U-MS-5 which allows for a five-story building, but the ground floor must be retail so that gives you an idea of what is in the works. Got kids? Well, the **Washington Park Early Learning Center** is moving to a new home in Platt Park at Hope Church (1801 S Logan St.) in January 2025. The preschool has been a fixture in the area for 50 years and is excited to bring their part-day cooperative model to Platt Park. As a co-op, families play a huge role in the operation and success of the school. Participants I've communicated with were very enthusiastic about the school and all it offers. Then & Now

Then School for Christian Instruction, Now Townhomes

In the early 1900s, the Christian Reformed Church in North America encouraged immigration to Platt Park, creating what soon became known as Little Holland. Three Dutch churches then created the nine-grade School for Christian Instruction at 735 East Florida, between Clarkson and Washington. In 1977, The Denver Waldorf School moved into the building, where many neighborhood children were educated during the Waldorf's 26-year history in Platt Park.

When The Denver Waldorf School outgrew the Platt Park site, the school sold the building. Developers demolished the building to make way for townhomes but retained the brick facade and trim reminiscent of the old school. The townhomes were completed in 2005.

The Dutch Reformed Church also built Denver Christian on the south side of East Evans, between South Pennsylvania and South Pearl. Interestingly, this building is the current location of the Denver Waldorf School.

ASBURY ELEMENTARY



At Asbury Elementary School, we emphasize community. Through our focus on social-emotional learning, our students listen to each other and support everyone's needs. All our Eagles know about the community snack table, where students can share their uneaten snacks with someone who might not have one. And our community came together on October 9th for our annual "Walk 'n' Roll to School Day," with captains stationed throughout the neighborhood to ensure our students walked, biked, scooted, and skated to school safely. Our community's strength and generosity is a force, and that's particularly apparent around the holidays.

Each December, our school organizes a Giving Tree so that all our students have a gift to open around the holidays. Any Asbury family that needs extra support can put their kids' names on the Giving Tree list. That list gets distributed to the wider school community, and families pitch in to donate gifts. Then a mighty team of volunteers—last year it was some of our young alumni—gathers to wrap and distribute them. It's a tradition we love to uphold.

But this spirit of generosity isn't reserved for the holidays. All year long, our school maintains a pantry of healthy, shelf-stable food that gets distributed through our Backpack Program. Through this program, kids from households experiencing food insecurity are sent home each weekend with a backpack full of food. To keep our pantry stocked, we rely on the generosity of the Food Bank of the Rockies, Bimbo Bakeries, and other amazing local donors. And, of course, the Asbury community. In October, we had a school-wide food drive, and families showed up with bags—sometimes even entire wagons—full of food and hygiene items to contribute. Our pantry was packed!

This winter, all of us at Asbury Elementary wish everyone in the neighborhood a joyful and abundant holiday season.

Seth Bartholomew Van De Riet, MSOM, of the Shawnee Nation Loyal Shawnee Band, began the day by honoring the landscape beneath and around us and its original inhabitants, by performing two Native American ceremonies.

Throughout the rest of the day, we envisioned and planned grass roots solutions for climate threats to our children's present and future. Five foundational projects emerged to lay the groundwork for our work in the years to come. Plans and commitments were made for the following: Online Clearinghouse of Information, Climate Educated Community, Platt Park Energy Strategy, Climate-Smart Landscape Team, and a Platt Park Climate Scorecard (a metrics system for measuring success).
